Van Nuys Airport Celebrates 86th Birthday

December 17, 2014, marked 86 years of aviation history for Van Nuys Airport (VNY).

VNY was originally known as Metropolitan Airport. It was founded by locals to bring aviation within reach of the outskirts of the rapidly growing Los Angeles area. Since its inception, VNY has been an important asset to the general aviation community.

Located about 25 miles north of LAX, amid 80 acres of trees and farmland, Metropolitan Airport – with its initial biplane hangar fees of \$35 per month and landing fees of 50 cents – was a place where pioneering pilots, who had faith in the future of aviation, could fly their "new-fangled flying machines." Early days at Metropolitan involved hosting a number of record-breaking

LAX Named 'Best Airport - North America'

Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) has been named "2014 Best Airport-North America" by *Business Traveler*, a leading print and online international magazine with readership of 175,000 frequent fliers and business executives.

The award recognizes the airport's "investment of billions of dollars and commitment to creating a transportation hub focused on connections, comfort, quality and value that improve the travel experiences of road warriors."

"LAX's current multi-billion-dollar, airport-wide improvements; continued revitalization of the airport's dining and retail offerings that reflect L.A. culture, cuisine, and lifestyle; and other passenger amenities are providing all visitors to LAX – including the important

business traveler segment – with a significantly improved customer service experience," said **Gina Marie Lindsey**, executive director of Los Angeles World Airports that owns and operates LAX and two other Southern California airports. She added, "The major U.S. airlines at LAX are also committed to passenger-service improvements by investing more than \$1 billion combined to renovate their terminals and airline lounges."

The more than \$7-billion LAX Modernization Program is creating nearly 40,000 construction-related jobs and pumps \$6.89 billion into the local economy. Furthermore, operations at LAX are responsible for 294,400 jobs in Los Angeles County and an additional 19,400 jobs in neighboring Southern California counties.

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flights of endurance and speed by both men and women.

With the 1930s came the Great Depression that took a toll on the modest airport. The corporation responsible for starting the airport was dissolved and the city of Hollywood came through to save Metropolitan from closure. Today, VNY continues to be an asset to filmmakers' aviation backdrop needs.

In the 1940s during World
War II, the federal government
took over Metropolitan and used it as a
military base. The U.S. Navy and Lockheed
Corporation opened an aircraft modification
facility to help serve defense needs. In
1949, the City of Los Angeles purchased
Metropolitan. By this time, the airport had
grown to 400 acres and was renamed San
Fernando Valley Airport.

The 1950s ushered in the "Jet Age." In 1957, the airport became officially known as Van Nuys Airport and had an annual payroll of \$43 million. As growth continued in the San Fernando Valley, the main runway was extended from 6,000 to 8,000 feet to accommodate larger aircraft.



By the early 1970s, VNY had become the busiest general aviation airport in the nation with more than 550,000 operations annually.

A study released in November 2007 shows that Van Nuys Airport continues to play a critical role in the Southern California economy, contributing \$1.3 billion annually, supporting over 12,300 jobs and generating an earnings impact of \$707 million.

Today, VNY remains one of the world's busiest general aviation airports and maintains its longstanding commitment to and leadership in general aviation, business and community service.
